### **Historic Context Statements**

- General Plan
  - Land Use & Community Character Element (P1-85)
- Municipal Code
  - Historic Preservation Ordinance (Chapter 17.32)

- The City shall maintain a Historic Context Statement
- Establishes a baseline of information against which historic significance is evaluated
- Exclusion of a resource type does not preclude a finding of historical significance
- Update every 5 years
- Submitted to the Coastal Commission as an LCP amendment



In order to understand the historic significance of resources in a given area, it is necessary to examine those resources within the appropriate historic context or contexts.





A Historic Context Statement is a written document that provides the framework for <u>evaluating a property</u> for historic significance and integrity. It answers questions such as:

- What aspects of <u>geography</u>, <u>history</u> <u>and culture</u> shaped the built environment of a given area?
- What <u>property types</u> were associated with those developments?
- <u>Why</u> are these properties important?
- What level of <u>integrity</u> is needed for them to qualify as historic resources?





The purpose of a Historic Context Statement is to place built resources in the appropriate <u>historic</u>, <u>social</u> and <u>architectural</u> context so that the relationship between an area's physical environment and its broader history can be established.



A **Historic Context Statement** is <u>not</u> intended to be a comprehensive history. Its purpose is to highlight <u>trends and patterns</u> critical to the understanding of the <u>built environment</u>.





The <u>specific purpose</u> of the context statement determines how broad or narrow the focus should be.

Monterey CountySan JoseLos Angeles

- Prepared as a first step in the development of a historic preservation program.
- Prepared in conjunction with historic resource surveys.
- Facilitate the simultaneous designation of properties thereby streamlining the process.
- Required for individual landmark nominations and historic resource evaluation reports.

Information detailing the historic <u>events</u>, <u>trends</u> and <u>people</u> important to the physical development of an area are organized into a series of contexts and themes.

### Associated Property Types

- Property types link the historic contexts to the built environment.
- Property types may be based on function, architecture, or both.
- Discussion of property types includes a general description, statement of significance, and registration requirements.
- The registration requirements should provide specific information that can be used for making judgments about the relative significance of a property including significance criteria and integrity level.



#### Identification

- Properties associated with agriculture and industry
  - Ranch houses, farm buildings
  - Fishing, whaling and extractive industries
- Properties associated with business and tourism
  - Commercial buildings
  - Hotels, Inns and Boarding Houses
  - Seasonal Homes
- Properties associated with transportation
  - Gasoline/service stations

#### Description

• Of each property type identified

#### Significance

- Primary buildings rather than ancillary
- High degree of integrity (business and tourism)
- Enhanced if associated with a prominent member of the business community
- Pre-automobile transportation resources (lower level of integrity expected)
