

- An active storm track during extended periods of January will bring near to above normal precipitation.
- February and March will have near to below normal precipitation as storm systems skirt the region. April's precipitation forecast is still uncertain.

 Temperatures will be near to above normal leading to an earlier green-up with significant growth in March and April across the lower elevations.

- El Niño core warmest sea surface temperatures are shifting west and weakening expected to become neutral by late Spring.
- This pattern suggests cooler than normal temperatures and above normal precipitation for the forecast period.
- Dead and live fuel moisture are above average and will remain so through April.

California snowpack is in a precarious state with conditions at 30% of normal. Northern Sacramento Valley, the Bay Area, and the Sierra Nevada are below to date averages for precipitation (see below) and while coastal Southern California is near average, much of this rain arrived in August from tropical storm influence before late December rains. Drought conditions could worsen if wetter El Niño effects do not materialize.





The Public Works Department is responsible for design, construction, operation and maintenance of improvements to public facilities, public rights-of-way, parks, urban forest, and Carmel Beach.

WHAT WE DO TO:

PREPARE

- On-call staffing
- Inspect, and clear all storm drains
- Remove known hazardous trees
- Set up sandbags
- Clear gutters
- Test generators and pumps
- Ensure materials and supplies on hand

RESPOND

- Support PD, Fire
- Close roads and beach stairs
- Remove fallen trees until safe
- Clear roads of debris
- Reset traffic control signs
- Coordinate with contractors, utilities

RECOVER

- Drain ponding water
- Remove tree logs
- Repair potholes, roof leaks, fences, signs
- Inspect leaning trees
- Clear, sweep streets
- Lessons Learned

TREES

- Urban Forest Master Plan
 - City owns and tracks an inventory of 10,000 trees
 - 3 on-call tree service contractors + Forestry crews
 - Prioritizing trimming of potentially hazardous trees
 - All 2023 Storm Related Hazardous Trees have been removed.

Reminder:

 Private Trees: Online permit application for tree evaluations, pruning (> 4"), and tree removal requests

Flooding

- Storms cause minor, localized "nuisance" ponding.
- Flooding from Carmel River rarely reaches south City limits, but backs up into the MTNP (no property damage)
- A Major Storm would cause temporary flooding, mostly in downtown, and potential property damage.
- New drainage projects underway along Lincoln, Second, Eleventh, Acacia Way headwall, and in south MTNP

TO REPORT:

- Tree limbs on PG&E power lines call 911 or 800-PGE-5000
- Fallen trees or large branches
- Any debris blocking intersections or streets
- Blocked drains
- Other infrastructure issues (signs, fences, City buildings)

The Department of **Emergency Management is** responsible for coordinating all emergency preparedness, response and recovery functions while developing, maintaining and enhancing the resources in the Monterey County **Operational Area.**

WHAT WE DO TO:

PREPARE

- Ensure all phases of emergency management are addressed in strategic planning efforts.
- Build core capabilities and disaster resilience within the communities of Monterey County.
- Identify and analyze potential hazards and recommend appropriate mitigation measures.

RESPOND

- Serve as the emergency point of contact for government officials, public safety, organizations, nonprofit and community based agencies, city, county and private industry partner and stakeholders.
- Organize, staff and operate the Operational Area Emergency Operations Center (EOC).
- Provide information and guidance to the public and elected officials including emergency warning and alerting

RECOVER

- Provide resource management inventories of critical assets, supplies, and equipment necessary to support emergency response and recovery operations.
- Support and guide communities county-wide in short and long-term recovery process.

The Department of Emergency Management facilitates and coordinates information, resources, and decisions regarding priorities among local governments within the Monterey County Operational Area (OA).

The OA serves as the coordination and communication link between the local government level and the region level.

ALERT MONTEREY COUNTY

Alert Monterey County is a system used by City and County public safety officials to deliver emergency notifications to residents and businesses impacted by, or in danger of being impacted by, an emergency or disaster.


Alert Monterey County uses the 9-1-1 database to call and deliver a recorded message to all landline phone numbers in a specific geographic area within a City and/or the County.

Residents may also be notified on their cell phone, Voice over IP (VoIP) phone or at their email address. Those wishing to receive messages on these devices must register online: <u>alertmontereycounty.org</u>




BEFORE A DISASTER HAPPENS TAKE THESE STEPS TO PREPARE:

 prepare a "Go-Bag"


- **NOTIFICATION:** Sign-up for Alert Monterey County and sign up for Nixle, a free notification system used by our police, fire, and city to advise subscribers of road closures and other emergencies with real-time updates on your cell phone, email, or both. Simply text your zip code to 888777 to enroll for free.
- **INFORMATION:** Check out Ready Monterey County from the Department for Emergency Management for guides on making plans, building an emergency kit, and much more.
- **EVACUATION:** Know (and share with your neighbors) the evacuation routes.
- **PARTICIPATION IN EVENTS & TRAININGS:** Attend preparedness events, including trainings, organized by the City and Carmel CERT throughout the year.







